The Legend of the Poinsettia

A charming story is told of Pepita, a poor Mexican girl who had no gift to present the Christ Child at Christmas Eve Services (Holy Mass). As Pepita walked slowly to the chapel with her cousin Pedro, her heart was filled with sadness rather than joy. "I am sure, Pepita, that even the humblest gift, if given in love, will be acceptable in His eye." said Pedro. Not knowing what else to do. Pepita knelt by the roadside and gathered a handful of common weeds, fashioning them into a small bouquet. Looking at the scraggly bunch of weeds, she felt more saddened and embarrassed than ever by the humbleness of her offering. She fought back a tear as she entered the small village chapel. As she approached the altar, she remembered Pedro's kind words: "Even the humblest gift, if given in love, will be acceptable in His eyes." She felt her spirit lift as she knelt to lay the bouquet at the foot of the nativity scene. Suddenly, the bouquet of weeds burst into blooms of brilliant red, and all who saw them were certain that they had witnessed a Christmas miracle right before their eyes. From that day on, the bright red flowers were known as the Flores de Noche Buena, or Flowers of the Holy Night, for they bloomed each year during the Christmas season. Today, the common name for this plant is the poinsettia!

Of course, that is just a story depicting a great truth. It is important to remember that Christmas is not a legend or a myth. It is a glorious reality. Bethlehem's manger became the link that bound a lost world to a loving God. Christmas has always had its critics and those that wanted to diminish its impact upon this world. We have those that want to celebrate the holidays with no regard to the one the holiday is about. One lady was heard to mumble, "I don't mind celebrating Christmas; but does it have to be so religious". This is the day and age that we live in; we want Christmas but not the Christ that goes with it. Christmas is more than holly, tinsel, sparkling snow, or children's laughter. Christmas is John 3:16. John Gandy Walk


