Chitter Chatter

The City of Cape Town has implemented **Level 6 water restrictions**. What this in effect means is that our daily water usage is, for the time being, to remain at 87 litres per person per day, irrespective of where you live, and unless targets continue to be missed as is currently the case. Mayor Patricia de Lille is quoted as having said that, "With the average household size in Cape Town closer to 3 people, much can still be done to ensure that we are not queueing for water in March or April 2018 when we would then have to consider lowering usage targets further." The new restrictions will mean that non-residential properties will have to reduce consumption by 45%, while agricultural users will have to lower their water use by 60%. De Lille said that the new restrictions also discouraged the use of borehole water for outdoor use in order to preserve the "precious groundwater resource".

Resident Kevin Newton brought to the attention of the RSC committee the fact that pensioners visiting the Zeitz Museum can do so on Wednesday mornings While we would very much like to take a group to the V&A Waterfront for just such an outing, the logistics of transportation make this However, from the 'Net I have extracted this information to whet the appetite of those of you who would like to see - and have means of getting to this magnificent, unique and fascinating icon of the Mother City: The Zeitz MOCAA (Museum of Contemporary Art Africa) - pronounced "zights mocka", which opened in September, (quote) "houses the largest collection of contempo-

rary art on the continent and is the only museum of its kind in Africa. Much of the art exhibited across some 6 500m² of gallery space belongs to German businessman and African art enthusiast, Jochen Zeitz, the main funder of this iconic new institution that comprises some 100 different gallery spaces.

Once a grain silo, built in the Twenties, the structure has been ingeniously re-imagined and redesigned by the 'Pied Piper of Architecture', Thomas Heatherwick. The outside concrete tubes are topped with jewel-like geometric windows. Once inside, before even seeing the art collections, it is possible to spend hours admiring the converted concrete, steel and glass interior. The cylindrical tubes sawed open are the most arresting feature of the atrium" the best viewing being via the lifts. Another access to the exhibition floors is via the steel staircase. "The stairs were dropped in piece by piece from the top into the reinforced silo. The maze of tunnels in the basement "used to house the conveyor belts that moved the grain from one section to another and allows you to see the funnels from which the grain would have flowed.

The works of some of the most respected artists - Nicholas Hlobo, Cyrus Kabiru, Hank Willis Thomas, Jody Paulsen, Kendell Geers and William Kentridge – are on display and Nandipha Mntambo's solo exhibition, which spans five rooms is unmissable; Kudzanai Chiurai's mixed-media work goes right around the floor.

More than a showcase of the continent's best art, Zeitz MOCAA aims to be welcoming space for all. Entry to the museum is free for under-18s and there's an art education centre for school children in the basement, complete with a designated drop-off zone. The museum also offers guided audio tours for visitors.

Visit in your own time – remembering that entrance is free (normally R180 pp) on Wednesday mornings 10:00-12:00 for African citizens or buy annual membership of R185 pp for over-60s (normally R250 pp). This gives you unlimited free admission to exhibitions, preferential queuing at the entrance and special member events, including talks, tours and extended opening hours. This makes people much more confident when moving in everyday life" and that "the postural alignment is very important in preventing falls in older people and could help keep them safe". Bet the Villets wholeheartedly agree with this viewpoint.

21 January is **Squirrel Appreciation Day** so in the spirit of Ubuntu - and as I know, there are many residents who think they're too cute for words - I will endeavour not to chase these little creatures w-a-y up a tree and out into the blue beyond. (Anyone who knows me will vouchsafe: Lucille is a birder and, well ... they do predate on avifaunal nests.)

The grey squirrel (*Sciurus carolinensis*), indigenous to the hardwood forests of North America, was brought to our fair land by Rhodes (who has much else to answer for) and are, for now, restricted to pine and oak plantations, as well as urban gardens where they are active early morning and late afternoon. Their home is called a drey, is soccer ball-shaped and constructed in a tree. Squirrels are mainly vegetarian, but supplement their diet with eggs and indeed the chicks themselves.
